GREAT MOMENTS IN TOUCH

Visits by PNG and Canadian officials to the 7th National championships in April



marked the start of the 1987 Touch year.

This year was to see the ATA send a touring party to Canada and the USA with players and coaches to be selected at the National Championships.

1987 saw significant changes in the way "things" were done at the Nationals, which were played in April in Perth. Selections for not only merit teams but for an Australian group to tour overseas were on the offering.

A new selection policy had been formulated and for the first time computers were used to record selection data for analysis, determination and eventual dissemination to all States and players.

The process of selection of Australian players was clear and transparent so much so that questions could be asked why so-called "favorites" did or didn't make a team. It was a great success and all the appreciated its openness.

These Championships were also a platform to test new ideas for selection of coaches. Interviews were conducted not only with the applicants but also with officials and players from the applicant's teams.

Again this showed the ATA as a leader in the professional approach it undertook in initiating Technical Policies.

As to the games played – NSW Women's proved to be the dominating force at this event recoding the highest score 25-0; scoring the most touchdowns, 60; and having the least scored against them of only 1.

The final was as tough as they come with the final score of 4-4 remained at both full, and after extra time. NSW won by simply being higher on the competition ladder. It was a disappointing way to lose a title and the Qld men can now appreciate the anguish felt by their 1986 women's team.

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7th NATIONALS HIGHLIGHTS

NSW men's team was out to avenge losses in the past two year to their archrival Queensland. On the other hand Queensland were on a roll and did not ant to let them off the hook.

The round game between the two giants resulted in a 0-0 draw, which saw them both go into the finals undefeated. ACT gave NSW a fright in the semis only going down 2-3, however the Qld team had an easy 8-1 victory. Western Australia (host state) came third while ACT were fourth.

It would appear the story of the Qld's mens plight would follow the womens team. Having drawn 0-0 with NSW during the round they did not want to lose another championship after again going through undefeated.

NSW however saved them form being disappointed again by beating them in the final 2-0. Karen Smith was named the players of the series and you may remember comments about her "maybe" having got a raw deal the previous year. (See 7th edition of newsletter)

It was rather ironic Karen winning this year as many experts believe Kerry Norman was the player of the series and those making these selection had got the past two years back to front.

ACT finished third losing only to NSW and Queensland while the Northern Territory team cane in fourth

The surprise package of the tournament was in the Mixed Division where the Michael Sparkes led ACT team defeated Queensland in the semis and went on to meet NSW in the final. NSW showed their class in this division and won 7-0.

Queensland finished third, Northern Territory fourth, Army fifth and Western Australia sixth.

In the mens 30's division, NSW went through undefeated winning 5-2 against Qld in the final. ACT and Victoria finished third and fourth respectively.

NSW thought they were going through undefeated in all division even drawing 1-1 with ACT in the Mens 35's and winning against Qld in the round game. However it was not to be. An intercept by Daryl Lansberg could not be run

down by "Bullet" and Queensland took the game 2-1.

ACT were third and South Australia 4th. This finals loss was the only defeat for the NSW camp at the championships as the mens 40's went on to win 3-2 against Queensland, also not losing a game.

ACT and Western Australia filled third and fourth places respectively. Needless to mention NSW were the State Champions with Queensland runner up and ACT third.

John Christopher re-asserted himself as the sprint champion in the Mens while Ann Drinkwater won the womens crown.

ALLSTARS OF TOUCH

Without doubt one of the stars of the eighties was Karen Smith. Appearing as an Allstar for the sixth time in seven years.

Mark Boland appears for the second year and "evergreen" Andy Yiangou makes a long awaited appearance as an Allstar. Steve Vickery, Geoff Wardrobe, Cathy Pearl and youngsters Mark Hearndon and Jacquie Anthony all from NSW make their first arrival in the top row of players for the year.

Queensland managed only the great Kerry Norman, Mark Ostwald and youngster Rodney Thorogood. Local WA hero Tim McKee with Mike Casey from Victoria made up the balance of the group.

Bob White was the Allstar coach with Peter McNeven as Manager. Mick Cook was the referee and Chris Carstens from Tasmania not only being the Allstar official but he was named as the Administrator of the year by ASSA.

FAMOUS INTERVIEWS



This is the fifth in the series of famous people interviewed by Ian Stanley, the Aussie Mens Open Coach. TV's roving reporter finally catches up with the legend of World

Cup Touch, the Master himself – Bobby Brindell.

Bobby may well be best remembered for his magnificent efforts as amens open player at 4 successive World Cups. In 1988 and 1991 he was the Mens Open Player of the Series and in 1995 and 1999 he was runner up.

The Australians voted him Players Player in 1995 and Most Valuable player in 1999. Few other players match his longevity at this level but his achievements at winning these awards stand his out from them.

His representative career with Qld began in 1988 and culminated in the final Nationals under the State v State format in 1996. During that period he missed only the '92/93 years and was player of the series in 1994. In 1997 the NTL was a reality and he played for his beloved Sharks from '97 to 2000.

State of Origin gave the two states of NSW and Queensland a chance to settle old scores and Bobby went out a winner having played in all Qld mens winning sides of 1995, 1996 and 1998. (NB no SoO was conducted in 97).

He represented at Queensland's State Championships from 1987 to 1997 being named player of the series in 1988, 1992, 1995 and 1997 – a remarkable feat.

Bob has 35 World Cup Caps and is ranked ninth in Australia with his representative career at World Cup. This is a tremendous effort given he could have played in the 30's division at the 1997 World Cup for Masters. However he is the equally highest ranked (No.1) mens open representative WC player (Scott Notley jointly sharing the honour)

He has 10 Test Caps and this ranks him in tenth place for test Matches played by an Australian. Having a total of 45 Caps for Australia overall Bobby is ranked as the eighth highest player to have represented his country and second only to Scott Notley as a mens open player

When did you first become involved in touch and why

I first became involved in Touch in 1984 – I was asked to play by an acquaintance, loved it and never looked back. Touch was a sport I thought of playing through High School, however, I wasn't aware you could achieve a National level if good enough

To what do you attribute your longevity at the elite level of the sport?

My longevity in the sport of touch is probably attributed to the absence from representative touch during 1992/1993. This was forced upon me mainly due to work commitments and possibly the move to 6 a side.

If you had to pick your greatest moment in your career – what would it be?

1. Being a part of 4 World Cups at Mens Open level, flag bearer in the 1997 Trans Tasman, reading the oath to open the 1999 World Cup, being part of an Australian team which had various players from different regions, states and territories, but I felt no fragments or outcasts.

Once we got to that Australian level and I commend Scotty and Bus for this; there was no internal rivalry. The friendships I have gained from this sport remain true and although I have not played for two years, we still have a social golf club of past, present and future players at the South Coast level.



What were some of your greatest challenges and moments in Touch?

2. South Coasts dominance at a State level throughout the 1990's. Leaving Brisbane on a winning note in 1989 and starting from scratch with the Gold Coast who were more interested in the double D's than playing Touch.

Gary Wakefield, my brother Laurie and I set a goal of winning the State Title within 3 years and we were lucky enough to get there in the 3rd year winning two drop offs, one to go into the final and the other in the final.

3. Three Losses out of 18 against NSW. Unfortunately 2 of these losses were in finals, however when you are playing against the likes of Mark 'Bus' Boland and Shane Frederikson, you get in, get the win and get out.

I felt Queensland went through a purple patch with a few old heads in Notley, the

Brindells, Pierce, Grehan and Foster and the young guns the McDonalds, Madders and Ward. This blend of youth and skill, age and treachery saw Queensland dominate throughout the 1990's.

4. The Win against the odds in Hawaii. Australia against New Zealand and specifically Craig Pierce dragging himself of his death bed and I actually think he provided us with the drive and determination to win.

In our semi final loss of 6-4 to the Kiwis, he was the only performer and he was sick, if Craig could do it then so could the rest of us.

Who were some of your most difficult opponent, and why

Scott Notley (I am talking about his attack) at his best is the best I have ever seen. What puts Scott above everyone else in my books is he has done it at 7 on 7 and 6 on 6. My first year in the State and National sides was in 1988 and I am not sure whether they meant to but I felt Scott and Bus took me under their wing, surprising from Bus considering I beat him over a 70 metre sprint before the World Cup was due to start.

The hierarchy chose Bus to sprint because he was the Captain and I was chosen due to being the Grommet, however the Kiwi streeted both of us and Bus ran a very close third. (Still have the picture)

To me, the quality of Bus was that he was always three plays ahead of the rest. I listened to him at training, talking to five of us, do this, go here, hit here and those of you who have played along side of him will know what I mean.

Since 1993, New Zealand had either won the first game in each series, be that Trans Tasman or World Cup and when it came to playing the Kiwis in the final of the 1999 World Cup a few of us were shit scared of not winning and not going out on a winning note.

However the first half of touch was not too dissimilar to the second half of touch in the final in Hawaii and eventually we increased our winning margin from that of 1988. This surprised me as I felt the Kiwis were improving dramatically.

Players like Corey Foster could have been the best to ever pull a boot on – if he knuckled down and trained – but I suppose he still had fun. Pat Grehan was another.

But my support goes out to the Indians, the workers, ruckers and defenders who made it easier for the attackers to do their thing.

Can you name some up and coming future champions.

Some champions of the future should be young players like Brent Madders, Ben Robinson, Jarrod Tump, Chris and Ash Farrow and the Malcolm boys from down Sydney way.

If there were a rule to change to better the game – what would it be?

Not so much a rule. I would love to see the game go to 5 on 5. People may think this would mean the faster players would have an advantage but I disagree. When Queensland played NSW in the first State of Origin, we were a bit worried about the NSW pace; however, you can only show your speed if you get through. The other reason why I would like to see 5 on 5 is because I don't play anymore.

THE LONG ROAD TO COFFS

How far would you drive for a game of Touch? Some make a big effort to get to play their game each week, but has anyone covered as many miles for a tournament as Broome's Sky Jamieson?

After Ansett's problems in September, the TouchWest 18 & Under State Teams seemed set to miss the 2001 tournament. While Perth based players took on the very difficult and crossed the country by bus, Skye jumped on a truck in Broome before joining teammates on the bus from Perth 30 hours later....for another 60 hours on the road!

After 14,000km by road, Skye had made it from Broome to Coffs Harbour and back again. So what made her do it??



"It was worth it", says Skye. "The truck ride wasn't great, but I had no other option." Despite the huge trip, Skye, well known for her unusual hair colours, was just happy to be on her way to represent WA for the first time. "There was no way I was going to miss all the action. I was just excited to be going on the trip", she says. Now back in Broome, Skye says the future for Touch in Broome is looking bright.

"It keeps getting bigger, & players are improving all the time". With 15 teams in the current Broome season, Touch in Australia's most remote Affiliate continues to thrive.

"The competition has 20% more juniors this season, with a number of families coming to play in Broome's social grade", says Broome Touch Association President Paul White, known by the local Touch community simply as 'Whitey'.

"The social grade is something new for the comp up here, and Beach Touch on Cable Beach....is there a better place in the world for a game of Beach Touch?", says Whitey.

And Skye takes her experiences of Touch at the 18s Nationals back to Broome where she started playing the game...and where she still spends warm winter days on Cable Beach or fishing in Roebuck Bay.

AUSTRALIA RETAINS TRANS TASMAN TROPHY

The Australian Touch teams retained the Trans Tasman Trophy in Hamilton New Zealand over the weekend when it won the final test match of the Series against New Zealand.

The Series involved three test matches in mens, womens and mixed divisions, with Australia winning the mens and womens divisions. The New Zealand mixed team showed they would still be the team to beat at the World Cup in 18 months time

The Series tapped off on Thursday 8 November at refurbished Westpac Trust Stadium in Hamilton with Australia winning the mens. The womens match was decided in a drop-off Australia's way, whilst the young Australian mixed team had a tough introduction to international touch, losing in a drop-off 9-10.

On Friday the teams met again with the Australian men winning in a drop-off, thus securing the trophy in that division. Australia's mixed were defeated by one touchdown giving the New Zealand team the Mixed trophy. The Australian women lost (4-5) its first game in 15 years of international competition.

On the final day of competition, the Australian and New Zealand teams had one rubber apiece, leaving the overall Series winner to be decided by the result of the womens test match.

The Australian women won the final match 3-2 to ensure the Trans Tasman Trophy remained on Australian side of the Tasman. The final game results were Women

NEW ZEALAND MAKE HISTORY

New Zealand created history in the just completed Trans Tasman Test series. For the first time in the history of Women's International Touch Australia lost a game. Not since their first test match in 1986 had the Womens team been beaten in test or world cup events. After being undefeated in 35 World Cup and 16 teat matches, game 2 of the series saw NZ run out winners 5-4 thus breaking a 15 years unbeaten run.

History was also created when the New Zealand Mixed team whitewashed the Australian 3 tests to nil. Never before has a NZ side proved to be so dominant over the Australian and simply confirmed their status and ranking of the number one Mixed team in the world.



On Friday the 16th November the WA Government presented the Bi Annual Western Australian Sport and Recreation Industry Awards.

TouchWest was nominated for the award for Provision of Sport and Recreation to Regional Western Australia. They were up against several other organisations and the hot favourites were a group from the Kimberley. This group worked with aboriginal youth and the Shire of Roebourne and hosted the North West Games and were expected tow in most awards.

The night commenced with the Peak Body Achievers Awards. These awards are decided up by the peak bodies, from within each membership group.

The WA Sports Federation Special Achievement Award recognises a member sport who have demonstrate a philosophy of sustained development and governance at all levels of sports

delivery across WA with an increasing membership base. They have a membership of 122 State Sporting Associations and the winner was TOUCHWEST.

The evening then moved on to the nominated categories with TouchWest taking its place on the podium with the other nominees for the Provision of Sport and Recreation to Regional Western Australia Award and the winner this time was TOUCHWEST.

The Minister's Award for Industry Excellence was the final award of the night was. This was the most prestigious Award for the evening honouring the most outstanding finalist of the categories presented at the Awards. And the winner this time was TOUCHWEST.

In her speech accepting the award, Robbie Watkins (EOTW) thanked the many volunteers the State has and who are so dedicated and committed to our sports delivery. Without them, we would not be accepting the awards.

The Executive Committee and State Technical Panel were thanked for their vision and leadership, which was another major contributing factor towards the awards.

The Department of Sport and Recreation, Healthway and the National Heart Foundation were thanked for their assistance and support, which allowed us to deliver the diversity and intensity of programs that we do.

Last but not least the staff – Sarah, Matt and Kathryn who are selfless in their dedication to Touch and give so much of themselves received a massive thank you.

Touch is a very proud sport and is honoured by the awards bestowed upon it.

Touchwest wants to thank all those who contributions to them winning the awards. Touchwest was the most decorated sport of the night – taking three out of twelve awards – especially as they were only nominated for one!

The recognition for their peers within the industry is a magnificent celebration of what they do and how well they do it.

TOUCH AT THE 8th AUSTRALIAN MASTERS GAMES

A record total of 47 teams comprising approximately 530 individuals competed in the Touch tournament of the Games from Thursday 11 October to Sunday 14 October.

The teams competed in ten divisions, as follows: Women 30, 35, 40 age groups; Men 35, 40, 45 and 50 age groups and three mixed divisions. A record 10 teams contested the men 50 age group.

The tournament attracted international participation, with Papua-New Guinea and New Zealand clubs fielding competitive teams. The event was also strongly supported by local, regional and interstate competitors.

Overall, the touch tournament was successful, in terms of the preparations for, the competition itself, the venue and facilities and the social events conducted by the Touch Committee for its players.

The competition was very keen in terms of team spirit, and, it was very pleasing to the enter ed committee to see seven of the divisions won by Newcastle teams, some managing to complete the entire competition undefeated!

The Committee received a lot of feedback from competitors – in terms of how well the tournament was centered and conducted, with games running on time, referees provided and available on time for each game, and overall quality of the competition supported by good

administration. In addition, the venue was highly regarded, not only general facilities but the quality of the fields.

Just prior to the tournament commencing the field on which the event was staged were named in honour of Newcastle Stalwart – The Kerry "Joey" Campbell field.

YASS TOUCH KNOCKOUT

Ninety (90) teams competed in the Yass Touch Knockout, which was held at Walker Park, Yass on $26^{th} - 27^{th}$ January 2001.



There were 48 Mens teams; 27 Mixed teams and 15 Womens teams involving teams from the Australian Defence Forces (5 teams); Crusaders (8 teams) and Southern Suns (10 teams) preparing for the 2002 NTL and from the Sydney; Erina; Umina; Portland; Bathurst; Orange; Albury; Griffith; Cootamundra; Young; Bowral; Moss Vale; Wollongong, Culburra; Canberra and Yass.

The standard of touch was very high especially in the Mens division, which involved the leading Sydney teams Parramatta; Hornsby; Wests; Norths; Penrith; Easts and St George.

St George, which was made up of former New Zealand internationals led by Peter Walters, took out the Mens A Grade final defeating the Roosters from the Eastern Suburbs 5-2 in the final after defeating West 11-4 in the semi-final.

The Roosters defeated the Crusaders 6-5 in the semi-final to make the final but found St George who displayed great skill too good in the decider.

St George after winning the final did the Haka and was clapped off the ground. They are great ambassadors for the sport and added a new dimension to the Yass Touch Knockout, which has now been conducted for 14 years.

In other results the Southern Comfort the Southern Suns Womens Open team led by Caryl Jarrett defeated the Crusaders 13-2 led by Maree Gutherie in the Womens final.

The Poidas from Erina led by Dean Wilbrow defeated the Menai Bulls 15-nil in the Mixed A Grade final; Nye Bros led by Charles Nye from Moruya defeated Joe Citrus led by Jason Restagno and Derek Santa Lucia from Griffith 11-8 in the Mens B Grade final; Drink-A-Lot from Penrith defeated Ford Civil from Peakhurst 11-10 in the Mixed B Grade final while the Macquarie Bank Lizards defeated the Hackers from Yass led by Chris Rawlinson 13-8 in the Mens C Grade final.

Julian Buckmaster the former Australian player regarded as the best touch player produced at Yass returned home to lead his old team the All Blacks into battle. Julian is the Media & Communications Manager for the Australasian PGA Tour.

Ben Webster another former Yass player led Parramatta while Paul

'Mary' McGregor the former St George-Illawarra Dragons enter played for the Southern Suns Mens 30's team and will play in his first NTL tournament in March.
