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# 9<sup>th</sup> NATIONAL HIGHLIGHTS

Probably one of the highlights was the weather. There were perfectly sunny days - with plenty of warnings about fluid intake and Sun protection.

Unfortunately many ignored the warning signs. Some very experienced Australian players fell victim to the heat – not wearing head protection, having fair skin and little hair.

Every State had their causalities except the one State you would expect not to be cautious – TASMANIA – not one incident.

This year was also the first appearance of Navy and Air Force personnel who joined with their Army counter-parts to represent as the Australian Defence Forces for the first time.

The Mens division saw Queensland go through undefeated but drawing the final 3-3 against NSW and after extra time when no further score resulted they were declared winner by virtue of being higher on the Competition Table.

The ACT were third and the host State NT were fourth. In the Womens, NSW regained the title they lost to Qld in 1988, but not before going down 1-0 to them in the preliminary rounds. Their 4-0 victory over Qld in the final erased the memory of the only title defence they lost.

South Australia was the dark horses finishing third with the host teams again coming fourth. Only four teams contested the Mixed division, which was won for the fifth time by NSW. Their proud record of never losing a Mixed final remained in tact defeating Qld 2-1 in the final. Act and the ADF filled minor placings.

NSW Mens 30's had a point to prove having lost their only title to Qld on their home turf in 1988. After defeating them twice in the preliminary rounds they never had

to change to meet them again as the ACT beat them 2-1 in the semi finals, then went down to NSW 0-3 in the final. Hosts NT came fourth.

The Womens 27's saw only three teams contest the tile whereas there were five in the previous event when the division was Womens 25's. Qld reversed the tables on NSW winning after extra time despite the score being 0-0 (higher on competition table). NT were third.

After surrendering the previous two Over 35's titles to Qld, the NSW team went through undefeated to narrowly win 1-0 in the final over their old rivals

ACT and Western Australia fill third and fourth places with ADF and NT filling the other positions. For the third year in a row since their inception, NSW Mens 40's took out the title with a higher position on the competition table after they fought out a 0-0 draw with Qld in the final.

ADF and NT came third and fourth. The overall title of State Champions was awarded to NSW after they had it taken from them in 1988 by Qld.

NSW dominated sprint events held at the titles. The locals however got in for their chop. Donald Hunter NSW won the mens; Michelle AH-Mat NT won the womens with Greg English and Kathy Staunton NSW winning the Mixed.

In the Senior divisions Kerry Norman won the Women 27's, Mick McCall the Mens 30's, Doug Pease NT the Mens 35's and Daryl Langsberg the Mens 40's. The relay was won by NSW

#### ALLSTARS OF TOUCH

1990 saw Kerry Norman receive her fifth accolade as an Allstar, Peter Buckland from Qld his third, Stacey Gregory, Andy Yiangiou and Scott Notley their second.

The famous Rugby League player from Qld Adrian Lam was named as an Allstar while fellow Queenslanders' Paulette Oldham also joined him on the Honours list.

NSW were further represented by Glen Haslem, Sue Dorrington, Eddie Hilaire, Joanne Van de Grind, as well as youngsters Michelle Clouth and Jamie Thomas. John Fielding from Western Australia also being named as part of the elite group

Maria Arthur who was an Allstar player in 1982 was named as Coach, Narelle Thompson from NSW as Manger and Tim Freebody as Referee. The Allstar Official was Bob Watts from the ACT.

#### **LETTERS**

Why are referees suddenly cracking down on the Rollball especially the silly interpretation of not facing the scoreline?

I don't know if they are "cracking down" as you put it – more likely they are enforcing the letter of the law that says you must face the scoreline and be parallel to the sideline.

Many games today especially at the elite level are fast and as the attacking drives forward they do so at an angel instead of straightening up to be parallel to the sideline. I'd suggest this is what they are penalizing.

## **FAMOUS INTERVIEWS**



After his successful chat with last issues' legend Darren Shelly, our roving reporter has taken on the challenge to talk to one of the all

time greats of Australian Touch. She was the first inductee in the Hall of Fame and is a legend of the sport – the great Karen Smith.

Karen was a pioneer of the sport with regard to fitness and excellence in performance. She represented Australia from 1986 to 1991 when she retired from representative touch at the height of her career.

She was capped nineteen time at World Cup and played eight Test matches for her country when Test were first introduced into the Touch calendar and were rarely played on any regular basis in those days.

Karen was a passionate 'blues' player who represented NSW from 1980 to 1993, firstly as a Womens Open player then their coach and finally for her last two season, as an over 30's player.

The Aussie Touch Allstars series named her as one of their players from 1980 to 1985 and again in 1987 a truly remarkable feat. Lee now takes up the interview

# When did you first become involved in touch and why

In 1975 I was playing basketball and a friend asked me to make up the umbers in their touch team. It was the first womens comp at Port Hacking... the old Sharkettes. They went on to win some great tournaments.

# You were the first player inducted into the Hall of Fame what made you such a "stand out" legend in your time?

This is a Anthony Mundine question. I was playing rep basketball so I had a pretty good level of fitness plus I was doing personal training. That helped me stay on top. I always had good hand/eye coordination and I loved football. In my very first game I scored 6 tries and people didn't believe I hadn't played before.

# What were some of your greatest challenges?

When I got older and still playing at the elite level for NSW I started playing against younger girls with the same number of years experience. They just started playing from a much earlier age.

To compete against younger opponents was a challenge and exciting, as I was always testing myself.

# Who were some of your most difficult opponent, and why?

Maria Arthur had a really great sidestep, Cheryl McCormack, Debbie Ginman, were very tough on the field and Lisa Neal had pace. We had a healthy respect for each other in those days but I don't think such respect is evident today.

If you had to pick your greatest moment in your career - what would it be?

I agree with what Stacey Gregory said in her interview; seeing the Sylvania Sea Lions win was just terrific. Of course the first time I represented NSW was special and then when I went on to represent Australia - that was even a more proud moment.

The success of the Sutherland womens open will always be with me their record speaks for itself.

# What were some of your greatest disappointments?

Well there were some personal moments when I felt disappointed that we did not win, more so for the rest of the team. There was an expectation that any team I played in was always going to win and that just was not the case.

Like all sports people you have good and poor performances and while we were hot – we were hot - but at times I feel I let the side down.

The Regionals' in 1989 at muddy Coffs Harbour was an example. Region 7 as it was known then was favorites and we met Region 8 in the final. Lisa Neal intercepted a pass and I chased her – but in the mud – she kept getting further and further away from me and scored. People asked me why didn't I catch her and all I could say was – She was too quick. Expectations!!



The National in 1993 in Sydney were another disappointment for me. I was coaching the Womens Open team and we had a very good side but there were too many conflicting personalities.

We lost 1-0 in the final to Queensland who had some great old stalwarts in Kerry Norman and Fiona Mahoney and new kids on the block with the Barr sisters. We should have won on our home turf – that really hurt.

Another disappointing time was when I cane back after injuries to play in the Womens Over 30's – it was extremely frustrating not being able to do what had done in the past. The mind was willing but the body wasn't.

## Karen, the then NSW Touch Ass. were very unforgiving as you weren't appointed coach again

Yes you could say that, and I suppose that was another of my disappointments but I moved on and found other interests - the sun still came up in the morning.

#### Biggest influence on your career?

I was fortunate to have 3 coaches from whom I learnt something. Each probably kept me going and interested in the game for so long.

Mick Dwyer, Bobby White and then Mark Eagan – all great coaches.

Who were some up and coming future champions when you retired?

I was playing against Kitty Maher and she was only 16. Also Gizelle Tirado and now Erin Turner is a rising star. Also I think Beau de la Cruz is a most exciting prospect.

What made you retie at such a young age when you nemesis Kerry Norman is still playing and coaching?

Injuries. A knee reconstruction and groin injury (which I still have) forced my playing retirement. Until last year I was involved through administration in school touch for over 8 or 9 years after my playing/coach involvement ended. Besides Kerry Norman is a freak.

## AUSTRALIAN SPORT AWARDS - SPORT INDUSTRY AUSTRALIA

The sport of Touch achieved unprecedented recognition at the 2001 Australian Sport Awards when representatives were nominated as finalists in three categories of this year's Awards. The ATA's Womens 20 years Youth World Cup team reached the final three in its category.

The Australian Sport Awards recognise excellence in sport on the national and international stage by Australian individuals and teams. The awards are the ultimate showcases for excellence across all areas of Australian sport, including athletic performance, coaching and refereeing.

The Awards were established in 1980 by the then Confederation of Australian Sport, now known as Sport Industry Australia (SIA) to honour those participants who excel in sport. Recipients of the Awards have included Alan Jones and Michelle Ford in 1980, Greg Norman and Debbie Flintoff King in 1986, Kieren Perkins and Kathy Watt in 1996.

In 2000 the Award for the most outstanding Male athlete went to Ian Thorpe, whilst Karrie Webb won the female athlete of the year.

Nominations are sought from the respective national sporting organizations and then voted on by the 52 members of the "Voting Academy". The winners are presented at the annual Australian Sport Awards.

The Awards not only recognise excellence by Touch participants but also a growing acceptance of the sport as a mainstream activity. The enormous growth of the sport in the Australian school system is testimony to its acceptance and

world appeal continues to drive international competition.

At the 2001 Awards, announced at the Gala Ceremony in Canberra in March, Touch individuals and teams reached the final eight in Young Australian team of the year, Official of the year and Team of the Year – National Competition.

## **HALL OF FAME**

A little know plague hangs in the Fairbairn Room of the ATA with the names of some of the greatest Touch players in ATA's history. These players have been inducted into Touch's Hall of Fame.

Needless to say the Karen Smith and Jerry Jacks was the first inductee when the Hall of Fames was instituted in 1988.



Karen is featured in this issue of Famous interviews and Terry will be the guest of honour in the next issue. At the time of her induction Karen had been involved in representative Touch since 1980. She captained NSW Womens from 1980 until she retired.

Karen was player of the final at the National Championships in 1983 and 1984 and player of the series in 1986 and 1987. She was named in all the Australian Merit teams until playing teams were selected.

She captained the Australian team - v- The Rest in Melbourne 1985 and captained the National Team on its tour of New Zealand in 1986, winning Players Player of the Tour Award.

Captained the Australian Team on its tour of Canada and the USA in 1987 and again was player of the series on tour. When presented with her Hall of Fame Award she was captaining the Australian Womens Team at the inaugural World Cup on the Gold Coast in 1988.

The other inductee in 1988 was the fabulous Queenslander Terry Jacks. In his day he was the doyen of great mens players.



He commenced his rep career in 1977 and was a member of every Queensland team from that time up until his induction in 1988.

He was named in all the Australian Merit teams from 1980 and captained Australian on the 1986 tour of New Zealand.

He is a life Member of the Eagles Touch Club and the Brisbane Metro Touch Association.
